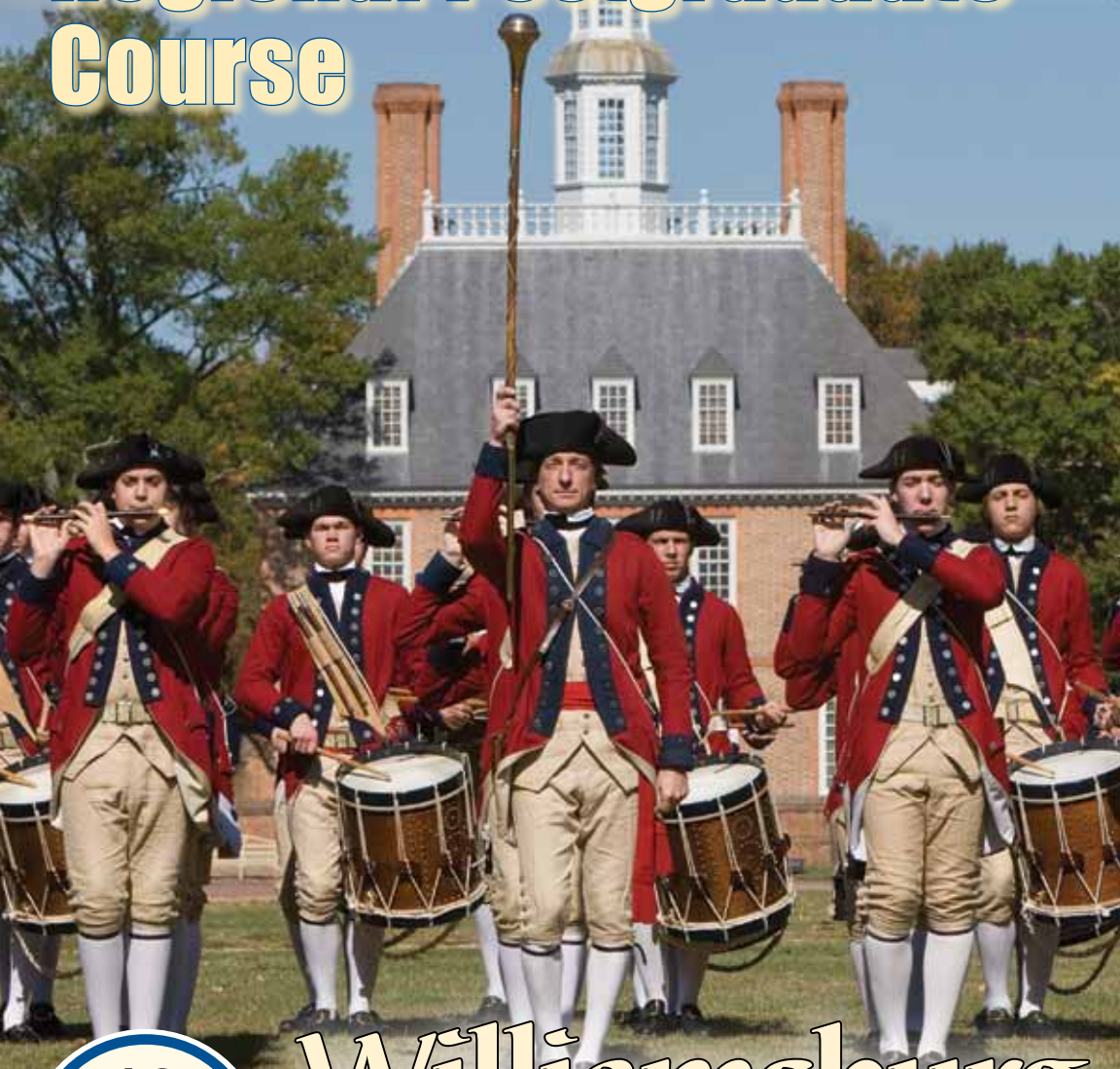

Program Description

The field of gastroenterology continues to experience an introduction of new and novel diagnostic techniques and therapeutic options affecting numerous areas of GI disease management and patient care. The program is designed to explore those areas which the gastroenterologist often faces in clinical practice and will address diagnostic and therapeutic updates. Case-based discussions with the expert faculty will occur allowing the participants to gain practical application of key learning points. Topics covered in the program are recognizing and treating *C. difficile*, update on acute pancreatitis, finding and managing flat lesions found during colonoscopy, endoscopy in the post-surgical stomach, Barrett's esophagus, practical tips for GI bleeding, secrets of missed colon cancers, asymptomatic liver abnormality, diagnosis and management of ascites, management of the hospitalized liver patient, endoscopic complications, the state of GI practice in Virginia, additional revenue streams, benchmarking of endoscopic procedures and practice, practical tips for the functional GI patient, practical proctology, and updates on IBD. This program is designed for gastroenterologists, primary care physicians, nurses, physician assistants and nurse practitioners interested in the latest information on diagnostic GI and state of the art treatment of these illnesses.

Program Objectives

Upon completion of this course, participants will:

- Evaluate *C. difficile* management implications with a special emphasis on prevention and management of recurrent disease.
- Describe peculiar aspects of endoscopy in patients who have undergone stomach surgery and managing complications of bariatric surgery.
- Detect and manage flat lesions during colonoscopy.
- Assess the current understanding of the management of acute pancreatitis.
- Determine clinical strategies in managing Barrett's esophagus and improve detection of dysplasia using conventional endoscopic techniques.
- Apply current diagnostic methods and treatment options for patients with GI bleeding.
- Identify reasons for missed colon cancers and minimize this outcome in your practice.
- Describe a pragmatic approach in management of asymptomatic patients with liver abnormalities.
- Differentiate the current therapeutic alternatives for the diagnosis and management of ascites.
- Determine management options for liver patients hospitalized with bleeding, renal failure or encephalopathy.
- Correctly identify and treat anal diseases seen in GI practice.
